## Bulk Collection Week

**Spring Bulk Trash Collection Week begins**

**Monday, April 22.** Items must be placed curbside by 6:00 am on Monday. Please clearly separate household trash from your bulk trash items. Please note the collection is simply an extension of your one-item-of-bulk-trash per weekly curbside collection service available to residents throughout the year. Items accepted include non-metal furniture, couches, mattresses, box springs, rugs/carpeting (rolled and tied in 4 foot lengths).

**ITEMS NEVER COLLECTED** during the bi-annual bulk collection and/or weekly curbside trash collection include all recyclable items (metal, paper, e-waste), prohibited items (hazardous waste, building materials, and items weighing more than 200 lbs.), and vegetative waste.

# Public Works

## Spring Branch Collection

The township will be conducting its Annual Spring Branch Collection starting the week of April 15. All brush needs to be placed curbside by this date as it will be a **ONE TIME ONLY** pick up. No return trips will be made. This collection usually takes 4 weeks to complete the entire township.

Branch Collection will be limited to **ONE (1) LOAD** per property owner, approximately 4 cubic yards. This is roughly the size 5 ft. Long by 4 ft. Wide x 5 ft. High. All branches will be no longer than 4 feet in length and 3 inches in diameter. This does not include LEAVES, VINES, STUMPS, and BUILDING MATERIALS, or any other non chippable items.

Loads larger than the guidelines listed above can be removed through the special branch collection policy by contacting the Engineering Office at 973-989-7066. There is a **\$150 FEE** for this additional service.

## Mulch

Delivery of fine shredded wood mulch will be available to residents from March through October. Each truckload contains approximately 6-8 cubic yards of mulch. If you are interested in having this product delivered to your residence you may contact the Engineering Office at (973) 989-7066.

Deliveries will be made every **Thursday and Friday** starting the week of March 4 and will continue to October 18. There is a delivery charge of **\$100.00** that may be paid when scheduling delivery with the Engineering Office.

As always, residents are welcome to pick up mulch free of charge at the Recycling Center on Sussex Turnpike. **MULCH IS ONLY AVAILABLE FOR PICKUP OR DELIVERY WHILE QUANTITIES LAST.**

## Street Sweeping

The township sweeps all of the township roads once the winter season is over. This operation is performed by our public works department and takes approximately three months to complete. Please do not deposit any large debris along the edge of the road that may enter our storm drains and may also hinder our sweeping operation.

# Clean Communities Day and Paper Shredding Event - April 27

## Clean Communities

Join local civic and scout organizations in tidying up Randolph Township at our “Clean Communities Day” on Saturday, April 27. All participants will receive gloves, garbage bags and t-shirts. Group leaders can arrange to pick up supplies in the Health Department on Thursday and Friday, April 25 and April 26 between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Mini-grants are available for civic groups. ## Paper Shredding

As part of its Clean Communities Day, the Randolph Township Health Department will once again offer confidential paper shredding services to residents, free of charge, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 27 in the Municipal Building parking lot. Residents must have their NJ driver’s license available as proof of residency. Residents will be required to follow the traffic pattern, park where directed, and remain in their vehicles. A DPW employee will assist residents with their items.

This shredding service is for:

- Randolph residents only
- Personal, confidential documents generated in the home only (not commercial or home-business generated)
- A maximum of three file boxes per household (file box = 1.5 cu feet).
- Confidential documents. This does not include junk mail and store flyers or solicitations.
- Documents must be free of any metal clips, rings or binders; plastic file folders, x-rays, CDs, etc.

# The Historical Society of Old Randolph

The Industrial Revolution that spanned from about 1760 through 1850 resulted in many children spending all week long working in factories. Since Sunday was the only available time for children to gain education, especially for poor families, the Sunday School movement began in Britain during the 1780’s. British Anglican evangelical Robert Raikes (1725-1811) was the main advocate of this movement, and it spread to America. By the mid nineteenth century, Sunday school attendance was mandatory in families, even if their parents didn’t attend church regularly.

Working class families appreciated their children receiving an education, even a religious one, by learning to read and write in copying out and reading scriptural passages, as well as practices such as prayers and hymn singing, for which they believed instilled Christian morality and Bible virtues. Sunday School children also looked forward to picnics, prize days, and other fun events associated with seasonal holidays on church grounds after Sunday school. # A Letter from the Superintendent

Our educators work hard each day to develop lessons and resources which empower students to develop self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision making. As a school community, we are constantly seeking ways to learn and adapt to innovative models which will continue to foster personal growth as well as the overall wellness of our students. Led by our Special Services and School Counseling Department, the district has been training staff on the Nurtured Heart Approach which is a philosophy and model developed to help students achieve their highest potential.

The guiding principles of the Nurtured Heart Approach include three different “stands” which help model ways in which staff can support students in their growth. The first stand was created to help students with challenging behaviors take ownership of their own “intensity.” Rather than criticizing bad behavior, this approach helps guide educators to provide students with different ways to utilize their energy to achieve success in more productive ways.

The second stand focuses on following through on that commitment to help students reach their established goals. Regardless of how big or small a student’s goal may seem or be, every goal achieved is important. It is essential that all children feel validated, and the second stand seeks to provide students with positive reinforcement for the value they can create through the energy they expend.

Lastly, the third stand focuses on setting expectations. Students should understand that there are consequences for certain actions and behaviors, but in a way where the student is both knowledgeable and feels empowered. By establishing clear guidelines, every child has the power to make autonomous decisions with agency. Autonomous, independent thought is incredibly important in all our classrooms, and each child can and should feel like they are in an environment where they understand what isn’t appropriate but also what is. Through a relational approach, children can have a voice and use that voice to express themselves authentically.

Our district is also participating in the Developing Resiliency with Engaging Approaches to Maximize Success (DREAMS) Program. The DREAMS Program provides educators with resources and training to promote healthy and healing school environments which in turn aid in supporting both educators’ job satisfaction as well as building classrooms that are conducive for student learning. As our new, returning, and soon to be graduating students embark on the next journey in their lives, we have confidence that they are prepared to thrive not just professionally but also personally. This is thanks to the consistent work our team does to provide every child with the very best support to succeed individually and collectively in life. We will continue to identify and implement the very best practices to support our students’ unlimited potential.

# Environment & Landmarks News

Do you have a passion for making Randolph a more sustainable community and to preserve our unique history?

If so please consider coming to the Randolph Environmental and Landmarks Committee (ELC) meetings to learn about key initiatives and potentially volunteering to drive or support an impactful project. The quarterly meetings are held on March 26, June 25, September 24, and November 26, at 7:30 p.m. at Town Hall. The ELC is empowered to conduct research relating to the protection, development, and use of open space and natural resources within the township and the protection, enhancement, and preservation of township sites and structures with historical, architectural, or cultural significance.

In the last year, the ELC rolled out two helpful environmental tools and supported the preservation of an important landmark.

- Recycling Coach, a free downloadable app from Google Play and the App Store, provides reminders about pick-up schedules and important do's and don'ts, e.g. oily pizza boxes are not recyclable. Download it today and don't miss a pick-up.
- The Randolph Township Environmental Guidebook (RTEG) available on the township website contains information about contributors to climate change and environmental degradation, and details projects and strategies that can be implemented locally to create positive and measurable change. Leveraging the Guidebook, you or your volunteer group can find a roadmap on how to scope, fund, and implement projects with the backing of the ELC.
- Three slices of the 300 year old Liberty Tree have been preserved and are ready to be hung indoors at the Randolph Museum, Randolph Library, and Randolph Town Hall. Sixty key dates in the town's history will be marked on the tree rings. Look for information about the dedication plans for each slice in the next quarterly newsletter.

## Solar Radar Signs

The Randolph Police Department, in conjunction with the Randolph Traffic Advisory Committee (TAC), recently purchased and installed new solar powered radar signs in the township. The signs are used to show drivers their speed and whether they are obeying the speed limit. The signs assist in having motor vehicle traffic obey the posted speed limit. Three signs have already been installed, while a fourth should be installed this spring.



## Overnight Parking on Streets

In Randolph, local ordinance 31-91 prohibits parking any vehicles on the streets of the township between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. daily. If you need to request permission for overnight parking, you must contact the Randolph Police Department and speak with the police dispatcher. Overnight parking requests will be considered for only short term, temporary time frames in which the resident has a legitimate and justified need to park on the street.

Examples of legitimate and justified needs are considered to be, but not limited to, driveway resurfacing/resealing, construction projects, and/or visitors from out of town who are staying at the home. Requests for overnight parking will not be considered and/or granted as a simple matter of convenience or for extended periods of time.

# 2024 Health Screenings

The Township of Randolph offers a variety of health screenings and programs throughout the year to promote and protect the health of township residents.

To pre-register for any of these clinics and screenings, please call the Health Department at 973-989-7050. Please note some of the clinics/screenings have registration cut-offs.

If you have any questions before or after your participation at a clinic or screening, please contact the Public Health Nurses at 973-537-7118.

## Cancer Screenings

**Who:** Men ages 45-75 years old. Screenings include a digital rectal exam and breast exam, prostate specific antigen blood test, urinalysis, blood pressure check, FIT test (testing for blood in the stool) and health education counseling. The PSA Blood test/urinalysis needs to be completed prior to the program. You must register by 5/17/24 and have a blood test completed by 5/24/24 to participate.

Women ages 18 and up. Screenings include a Pap test, pelvic and breast exam, FIT test (blood in stool), mammography referral (if eligible) and health education counseling.

## CHEM-23

CHEM-23 is a comprehensive blood test used to provide valuable information about the general state of your health. Information obtained may be used to recommend dietary or lifestyle changes. The test also aids in detecting abnormalities that may be causing specific symptoms and can be useful in evaluating a specific health condition and monitoring the effectiveness of its treatment. Blood pressure checks are also conducted in conjunction with each session.

**Who:** Screenings are available to all Randolph residents 18 and older.

**Date and Time:** May 17 at 8:00 a.m.

**Where:** Randolph Township Municipal Building

**Fee:** \$35.00/\$25.00 for over 65 years of age

**Pre-registration:** Required by calling the Health Department 973-989-7050.

In addition, new clients or those with a new physician will need to provide a signed consent form from their doctor in order to participate. Appointments are necessary; each session is limited to fifty participants.

## Child Health Conferences (birth to age 18)

Child health conferences, including full health assessment and immunizations, are conducted on scheduled clinic dates.

**Who:** Services are available to qualified residents. Children from birth to age 18 who meet financial guidelines.

**Dates:** May 15, September 18, October 16, November 20

**Fee:** Free

Appointments required by calling the Public Health Nurses at 973-537-7118 for eligibility requirements and assessment.

## Vaccines for Children (VFC):

All ACIP recommended vaccines available to children from birth through 18 years old, with Medicare Part A or uninsured, by appointment only.

### Flu Clinics:

- Randolph offers flu vaccines to anyone over 6 months of age and above. Dates, times and locations are posted on the website [www.randolphnj.org](http://www.randolphnj.org) in August as flu season approaches and our supply of vaccine arrives.
- The fee is \$20.00 for flu, or free to those with Medicare Part B ONLY. Those with any Medicare co-pay plans must self submit for reimbursement.
- Advanced registration for the clinics is not required. Home visits are available for those with special needs by calling the Public Health Nurses at 973-537-7118.

Covid vaccination is available to homebound residents by appointment, please call 973-537-7118.

## Adult Immunization Program:

**What:** 317 Funded Vaccines for Adults (19 years and older) This program is offered through the 317-funded program for vaccines for adults. The vaccines that are offered are: Covid, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Human Papillomavirus (HPV), Measles/Mumps/Rubella (MMR), Meningococcal, Meningitis B, Prevnar 20, Tdap, Varicella, Zoster (Shingles, Herpes Zoster) and Influenza.

**Who:** 19 years and older

**Dates:** April 9, May 14, June 11, July 9, by appointment only.

**Fee:** Fee for service or FREE to those uninsured or underinsured. “Underinsured” means insurance will not pay for any portion of the vaccine at all.

Appointments required by calling the Public Health Nurses at 973-537-7118.

# Zoning Q&A

**Q. What types of construction require a Residential Zoning Permit?**

- A. Zoning permits are required for the construction, erection, demolition or major alteration of any structure including, but not limited to, fences, decks, pools, sheds, building additions and interior alterations.

**Q. Can I store my commercial vehicles at my home?**

- A. You may store one commercially registered vehicle if it is a standard size van or pickup. Anything larger must be garaged. Please call the Zoning Officer for more details at 973-537-7128.

**Q. Can I store my RV or boat at my home?**

- A. You may park such vehicles on your property as long as they are properly screened. Please call the Zoning Officer for the regulations.

**Q. Can I sell my car from my home?**

- A. You may sell only one car at a time and it must be located on your property.

**Q. Do I need a permit for a shed?**

- A. You must get a zoning approval for any size shed. You must also get a building permit for a shed larger than 200 square feet.

**Q. Can I put my shed anywhere on my property?**

- A No, all freestanding accessory structures (i.e. pools, sheds, garages), must meet certain setbacks for your zone. Call the Zoning Officer for details.

**Q. Can garden sheds 100 square feet or less be placed closer to the property lines?**

- A. Yes, each property may have one garden shed within the required setbacks up to five feet from a property line.

**Q. What hours may residents and landscapers operate lawn mowers?**

- A. Lawn mowers with a muffler may be operated between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. weekdays and 9:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. on weekends and legal holidays.

**Q. Can I use heavy machinery in my yard on the weekends?**

- A. No, construction with heavy machinery is prohibited on weekends and at night. Tree clearing, earth moving, and demolition are included, as well as all construction projects. The police will respond to any violations.

**Q. When do I need a lot grading permit?**

- A. When land disturbance involves the construction of 1,000 square feet or more of new impervious area or 2,500 square feet or more of new soil disturbance, except for normal agricultural operations in connection with a farming operation. Contact the Engineering Department for details at 973-989-7066.

**Q. Do I need a permit to cut down trees?**

- A. Yes, contact the Planning Department for details at 973-989-7080.

**Q. Are there any additional requirements if my property is located near a river, stream, lake or any freshwater wetland or transition area?**

- A. Yes, NJDEP regulations limit the types of construction activities in these areas. It is recommended that residents review their proposed projects with the Engineering/Planning staff in the early planning phases.

**Q. How far from my house must a pool be located?**

- A. In addition to rear and side yard setbacks, pools must be at least 12 feet from the principle structure.
