### Veterans Community Park Dedication

Veterans Community Park on Calais Road was dedicated on Saturday, October 17. Over 150 people attended the dedication ceremony which was held on a perfect fall day under blue skies. Township Manager Steve Mountain presided over the dedication ceremony along with the Township Council, township staff and volunteers, Senator Anthony Bucco and members of the Morris County Freeholders.

Mayor Chris Carey presented information on the planning and development of the park; Councilwoman Marie Potter spoke about the Randolph Township time capsule; Deputy Mayor Joanne Veech explained the process for developing the community garden; Township Historian Gail Hari provided a history of the park location from the 1700s through the present day; and Senator Bucco thanked the veterans in attendance for their service.

Following a rifle salute by the members of VFW Post 7333, the dedication stone was unveiled and a bench was dedicated to long-time VFW member Jack Sassaman, who passed away in May 2020.

In addition, the Randolph Historical Society was present to offer general information on the history of Randolph and the Randolph Museum. Members of the Randolph Community Garden offered tours of the garden, and the Trails Advisory Committee distributed trail maps and spoke about opportunities to join the Friends of the Randolph Trails.

Veterans Community Park was conceived during the 2016 Parks Master Plan as a location to hold community events and to offer amenities that were either not available in other parks or warranted additional facilities. Included in its features are:

- 168 bed Community Garden
- Bandshell with event lawn for hosting community events
- Pavilion and grills for picnic rentals
- Gazebo for small group gatherings



- Permanently installed, fenced pickleball courts
- Restroom and maintenance facility
- Lighted, paved 1/4-mile walking path around event lawn
- Paved 1/3-mile path connecting to Randolph Trails system and Patriots Path
- Paved connecting path to Trout Brook

While the event on October 17 was open to the public, crowd size was limited due to COVID-19 restrictions, and safety protocols such as mask wearing and social distancing were observed.

During the week following the dedication, the township time capsule was officially sealed until its scheduled opening in October 2045.



### COVID-19 – Please Remain Vigilant

As the COVID-19 pandemic continues, we should all persist in doing our part to protect the health of ourselves, our loved ones, and our community. By following the U.S. Center for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines and direction from the NJ Department of Health we can minimize the opportunity for exposure to COVID-19 and work together to aid healthcare workers, essential workers, and first responders as they work tirelessly to serve during this ongoing public health emergency.

It is widely known that the transmission of COVID-19 is mainly from person-to-person among individuals who are in close contact with one another. Individuals may or may not display symptoms. Those exhibiting symptoms should stay home, except to get medical care, and refer to their healthcare provider's instruction.

It is important that community members continue to wear face coverings in indoor and outdoor settings, especially when social distancing guidelines are difficult to maintain. Indoor gatherings pose more risk than outdoor gatherings, and large gatherings should be avoided. The CDC recommends that the number of attendees at gatherings be limited and that social distance and proper sanitary practices be maintained.

Testing for COVID-19 is now widely available at facilities across the county and state. Information about testing sites, COVID-19 travel advisories, and symptom guidance can be found on the New Jersey COVID-19 Information Hub website at covid19.nj.gov.

In addition to practicing social distance and following public health safety guidelines, community members should be aware that the NJ Department of Health actively conducts contact tracing efforts by calling individuals who have tested positive for COVID-19 or have been in contact with someone who has. Contact tracers will reach out via phone call or text message; they will provide their name, agency, and phone number. Contact tracers will never ask for private confidential information such as social security numbers, credit and debit card numbers, and immigration status. It is vital that contacted persons respond to contact tracers as the information they relay is crucial to saving lives and preventing further spread. Visit covid19.nj.gov/testandtrace to learn more about the importance of contact tracing.

Community members should consider downloading **COVID Alert NJ**, a free and secure mobile app that anonymously alerts users if they have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19. The app uses Bluetooth proximity technology, never records any identifying data, and ensures that all users remain anonymous. The COVID Alert NJ app can be downloaded from the Google Play Store or Apple Store.

Together we can protect the community from further spread of COVID-19. By maintaining our social distance, getting tested, being responsible, and answering contact tracers, the opportunity for exposure and spread is greatly reduced.

# RANDOLPH *in brief...*

## A Message from the Mayor

As 2020 comes to a close, it's a time for reflection. This year has been a year like no other; one that we will never forget. Beginning in March, the COVID-19 pandemic brought significant changes throughout the world and in our community. Schools and businesses closed and public health experts formulated guidelines and recommendations as they learned more about the novel coronavirus. We learned about social distancing, flattening the curve, and the sacrifices of our essential workers and healthcare professionals. During the year, many Randolph residents contracted the virus, some experienced severe symptoms and had to be hospitalized, and sadly, some passed away due to COVID-19 infection. The pandemic affected us all. Randolph Township staff worked hard and continued to deliver all essential municipal services throughout the pandemic. Although we had to close township buildings, we were able to offer alternative ways to conduct business. Meetings were conducted virtually; our public health nurses worked overtime conducting contact tracing and advising residents; daily communications were issued to keep residents updated about the pandemic and its impact on Randolph. Everyone learned to adjust to the "new normal".

In spite of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Township Council, working with the Township Manager and staff, was able to accomplish a great deal this year. Some key highlights from 2020 include:

- Adopting a fiscally responsible budget that balanced the short- and long-term needs of the community, maintained current services, and included no increase in the municipal tax levy for the fourth consecutive year.
- Creating the Diversity and Inclusion Committee, in collaboration with the Randolph Board of Education and the Morris County Council on Human Relations, to assess the causes and impact of bias-related incidents in Randolph and to make recommendations for programs to address bias in our community.

- Being recognized by Safewise as the 33rd safest community in the United States, a reflection of our commitment to making the safety of all residents a top priority.
- Opening Veterans Community Park, a wonderful addition to our community. The beautiful park includes, among other features, a community garden, an outdoor stage area with event lawn seating, pickle ball courts and a quarter mile lit track for walking, running and biking. Funding came from the Open Space and Recreation Trust Fund, so there was no new tax impact on residents.

- Advancing our collaboration with Morris Habitat for Humanity to build 25 affordable homes in Randolph on the former EA Porter site on Bennet Avenue.
- Welcoming several new businesses to Randolph, even during the COVID-19 pandemic, and developing a New Business Welcome packet to assist businesses interested in starting up, expanding, or relocating in Randolph Township.
- Installing a new cell tower on the municipal property on Millbrook Avenue to expand and improve cell phone coverage in Randolph.

I would like to thank Randolph residents for their support this year. It was truly an honor and a privilege to serve as Mayor of Randolph in 2020. As the year comes to a close, I ask all residents to continue to follow public health guidelines designed to help keep us safe during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Hopefully we will get back to "normal" in 2021.

May the New Year bring you good health and much happiness.

## From the Tax Office

### 2020 Open Tax and Water and Sewer Charges

As the year comes to a close, please be sure that your tax and water and sewer charges are up to date. Any 2020 open balances extending into 2021 may be subject to further action. ### 2019 Senior Freeze (Property Tax Reimbursement) Program

From the State of NJ Division of Taxation:

*The State budget that went into effect on October 1, 2020 fully funds the 2019 Senior Freeze program. Payments began being paid to eligible taxpayers on October 15, 2020 and continue on a rolling basis as applications are received.*

**UPDATE:** The application deadline for the 2019 Senior Freeze Program has been extended from November 2, 2020 to December 31, 2020.

The Randolph Township Public Works Department will be picking up residents' Christmas trees this holiday season. The trees must be bare with no stands, ornaments, lights, tinsel, etc. Christmas trees must be put out at the curb **no later than January 8th**.

Trees put out later than this date WILL NOT be picked up by the township. However, Christmas trees will be accepted at the Recycling Center anytime during normal working hours.

The Randolph Economic Development Committee (EDC) encourages residents to **SHOP LOCAL**. Our township is full of small businesses that are in need of our support! Even though COVID-19 saw the unfortunate closure of some local businesses, the real estate community is seeing an uptick of "Mom and Pop" businesses that want to make Randolph their home. Just this past fall, we saw several grand openings of small businesses including medical offices, personal services and office professionals. Even more exciting is that there are more new businesses to come, including a large radiology group, a prominent law firm, Wawa, & Metro Self Storage.

Randolph Township's AAA MOODY rating, demographics, and economic strength have appealed to many businesses. The EDC has been showcasing businesses on Randolphlocal.com via the "Business Spotlight." This past fall an email campaign was developed to reach out to all businesses in Randolph to provide them the opportunity to be highlighted on Randolph Local and our newly updated social media platforms, including Facebook (@rtnjedc) and Instagram (@randolphedc). ## Health Department Welcomes New Employee

The Randolph Township Health Department welcomes Zachary Taus as the newest Registered Environmental Health Specialist. Zach graduated from Rutgers University in 2020 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Public Health. His main duties include environmental, housing and restaurant inspections and code enforcement. ## Health Department Offers Adult Vaccines

The Randolph Township Health Department offers adult vaccines through the Adult Vaccines for Children (AVFC) program. These vaccines are available to those ages 19 and older who are uninsured or underinsured. The available vaccines include Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Human Papillomavirus (HPV), Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Meningococcal, Pneumonia Polysaccharide, Prevnar 13, TdaP, Varicella and Zoster (Shingles, Herpes Zoster), and Influenza. ## Prevent Water Meters and Pipes from Freezing This Winter

Cold weather is ahead of us! Now is the time to safeguard your home by preventing water damage from frozen pipes and water meters that bring costly repairs. Take a few simple precautions now!

- Turn off outside faucets. Disconnect the hose. If you are going to be away for the winter, turn off the water from inside your house and drain the pipe.
- Never completely shut off the heat when you are away. If you are planning to leave your home for an extended period of time and you don't drain your pipes, lower the thermostat, but never shut it off. The lack of heat can freeze the pipes in the walls and basement. Freezing bursts the pipes and when the house warms up, the thawing water will cause flooding and significant damage.
- Patch any cracks and holes in doors, windows, and walls near pipes. When the temperature drops to near zero, a high wind blowing through a small opening can freeze a nearby pipe, even though the temperature in the room is 70°F.
- Insulate water meters, pipes, and faucets in unheated areas. Wrap pipes with pipe-insulating material which is available at hardware stores.

If you should experience frozen pipes, DO NOT USE A TORCH WITH AN OPEN FLAME TO THAW. The easiest and safest way to thaw a frozen pipe is to heat the room or use a hair dryer. Set the dryer on low heat and wave the warm air back and forth along the pipe. Placing a warm towel or rag around the pipe may also do the trick. Remember, the pipe may already be broken and, when the water is thawed, it will leak.

Be prepared by taking precautions now. Have your furnace regularly serviced, insulate drafty areas, inspect your plumbing, be familiar with your plumbing system, know where your inside water shut off valve is located and verify that it is working properly. Make sure you have your plumber's name and telephone number handy. Being prepared for the cold can keep you from being left out in the cold without water this winter.

## Snow Removal Reminders

### Snow Removal and Mailbox Damage

One of the unintended consequences of any municipal snow removal program is mailbox damage. In most cases, damage to mailboxes results from snow being displaced from truck plows into the township right-of-way. The township plow drivers make every effort to avoid such damage; however, sometimes the impact on mailboxes is unavoidable.

**Residents are advised that it is the policy of the township to not replace mailboxes damaged during the snow removal process.**

To guard against mailbox damage, we ask that residents ensure proper mailbox placement within the township right-of-way. Mailboxes should not protrude beyond the curb line into the street as to prevent any damage from plows removing snow from township streets. The United States Postal Service has guidelines regarding mailbox placement which can be found at [www.usps.com/manage/mailboxes.htm](http://www.usps.com/manage/mailboxes.htm); these guidelines can also be found on the township website at [www.randolphnj.org](http://www.randolphnj.org).

**Residents are encouraged to check mailboxes now to ensure that they are as secure as possible.**

### Snow Removal Ordinance

Local Ordinance #44-82 states that if the sidewalk in front of your house is on a "Designated Walking Route" for school children, you are required to clear the sidewalks of any snow or ice accumulation within 12 hours of daylight following a snow or ice event. If your sidewalk is not on a designated walking route, it must still be cleared within 24 hours of daylight following a snow or ice event.

Local Ordinance #44-84 states that no person shall place, cause to be placed, or permit to be placed, any snow or ice upon any street, road or sidewalk within the township in any manner that will obstruct or impede vehicular or pedestrian traffic, or block any access to any street, road or sidewalk.

**Please note that neither residents, nor private contractors, are permitted to push snow from their property into or across the street.**

### Clear the Hydrants After Snow Events

The Fire Department asks all residents to clear the fire hydrants after snow storms. Please check for your nearest hydrant, even if it is not on your property, and shovel it out. Fire hydrants that are not cleared are hard to find, and difficult to operate. Your effort saves firefighters valuable time in an emergency and it could save a life.



## A Letter from the Superintendent

Every generation has faced its fair share of challenges; however, COVID-19 has presented our district with unique obstacles that we have had to overcome. One of those challenges was, and continues to be, the assurance that all students and staff have the tools that they need to take care of their own personal needs.

During the fall we hosted a professional Day of Wellness for all staff with the goal of helping our team develop additional skills in trauma management. During that day, we were delighted to host a special keynote facilitated by Laura van Dernoot Lipsky, the Founder and Director of The Trauma Stewardship Institute and author of Trauma Stewardship and The Age of Overwhelm. Widely recognized as a pioneer in the field of trauma exposure, Laura has worked locally, nationally, and internationally for more than three decades. Much of her work is being invited to assist in the aftermath of community catastrophes – whether they are fatal storms or mass shootings. We invited Laura to speak to our staff because we understood the challenges that have faced our learning community as a result of COVID-19. Laura helped discuss the impact of this trauma and provided real tools for managing stress. Courses offered at the Day of Wellness provided continued education on topics such as Self-Care,

Counseling, Social and Emotional Learning, Hybrid Instruction, and Technology. The goal was to offer a blend of experiences aimed at promoting both staff wellness as well as student wellness.

As we enter the new year, it's important that wellness continues to be one of our top priorities, not just in our learning community, but also in our greater Randolph community. We cannot be collectively strong if we are not individually strong. Wellness, social and emotional health, and self-care matter. There are many ways we can focus on personal growth and well-being. We can often gain a fresh perspective by getting outdoors and experiencing nature. We can help to prevent fatigue and cognitive overload by simplifying our responsibilities whenever possible. Sometimes, just getting a little extra sleep can be the best medicine. Taking that time to relax and repair can be critical for overall mental and physical health. In whatever ways you choose to cope with stress and trauma, I hope that 2021 can be a year of healing for our community. Let's have a great new year.

# Randolph Police News

## Police Department Re-Accreditation

On July 20th the police department underwent an assessment for re-accreditation through the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police. This is the third time the police department has completed the rigorous and extensive process obtaining the first accreditation in 2013 and the second in 2017. Following the assessment, the police department was recommended for re-accreditation. New Jersey has approximately 570 law enforcement agencies that are eligible to apply for accreditation. Of those agencies, about 42 percent have gone through the process, 23 percent have gone through it twice, and only 12 percent have received accreditation three times. This is a significant and noteworthy accomplishment which highlights the department's pursuit of excellence and the commitment to providing the highest level of service to the community. To achieve accreditation in law enforcement, a police department is required to achieve over 105 standards in the process. Accreditation standards cover five different functions: Administrative, Personnel, Operations, Investigative and Arrest/Detainee/Prisoner Handling.

## Lock It or Lose It

The Randolph Police Department would like to remind residents to remove valuable items from their vehicles overnight and to always keep their vehicles locked. When investigating thefts from motor vehicles, more often than not the owner did not lock their car, allowing burglars easy access to the inside of the car. If you see any suspicious activity, please don't hesitate to contact the Randolph Police Department.

The Randolph Police Department reminds residents and businesses that they can register their privately-owned surveillance camera systems. By registering your camera system, officers and detectives will be able to identify cameras that may have captured criminal activity. You will only be contacted by the Randolph Township Police Department if there is an incident within the vicinity of your property. Officers or detectives may request to view the footage in order to assist in their investigation. ## Micro-Milled Section of Millbrook Avenue

You may be wondering what happened to the roadway on Millbrook Avenue between Carrell Road and Church Road, as the asphalt on the curve is noticeably different than the rest of Millbrook Avenue.

Over the past several years, the Randolph Police Department responded to several motor vehicle crashes involving vehicles going off the roadway at the curve during periods of heavy rain. It was decided, in coordination with the Morris County Road Department, that the asphalt in this section of the roadway be micro-milled. The micro-milling will give vehicles better traction as they navigate the curve which will reduce the number of motor vehicle crashes in this area.

## New Traffic Calming Sign

The Randolph Police Department has added a new solar powered speed limit sign to its arsenal of traffic calming measures. The Support Services Unit of the police department routinely deploys digital speed limit signs to show drivers their speed and to assist in getting motorists to obey the posted speed limit. The newest sign will have a green display if the driver is obeying the speed limit and a red display if they are speeding. The police department currently has three solar powered and four battery powered signs that get deployed throughout the township where speeding issues are most often reported. The police department has received positive feedback on their effectiveness.



## Randolph Rescue Squad

### Facing This Pandemic with Steadfast Courage and Commitment

Despite, or more likely because of, the COVID-19 pandemic that has been confronting us for close to a year, eighteen new members have joined the Randolph Rescue Squad (RRS). They have accepted the responsibilities of membership, and we wholeheartedly welcome our largest probationary class in our 50-year history. We thank them for JOINING OUR TEAM. Likewise, we thank our full roster of members for their loyalty and assistance now and over so many past years.

What does training our newest members involve? RRS Captain Todd Houston, the instructor, and our RRS officers coordinate each stage of the training that takes place two nights a week for four weeks. Students learn basic skills such as first aid and CPR plus more advanced techniques like emergency driving. A three-month (minimum) probationary period follows the initial training. The trainees take on the role of ambulance operator or caregiver while under the supervision of experienced RRS EMTs. The goal is to prepare the new members to take the 225-hour state EMT course, allowing them to administer the highest level of care that we provide. It is no wonder that we applaud enthusiastically when new members take the oath of a full member during a monthly business

meeting. They state that they will "impartially perform [their] duties to the best of [their] ability, whenever, wherever, and to whomever may need [them]." That is a life-changing promise.

We have another positive occurrence to share with you during this stressful time. A unique RRS family situation transpired recently. During the past several years, Captain Todd Houston has guided his sons and daughter as they mastered their own training and certification programs. Not only that...all 3 siblings have participated on separate calls involving CPR saves. We are proud of the entire Houston family: Todd, Daniel, Amanda, George, and Jennifer (wife/mother/nurse).

Let us hope this destructive COVID-19 pandemic will be defeated. Meanwhile, RRS is grateful for your donations. Team effort helps us move forward. We urge the entire Randolph community to be cautious and vigilant: look out for family, friends, associates, neighbors, and yourself. Wear a mask, wash your hands, use sanitizers, and observe social distancing. Stay safe.

## Fire Department News

### Smoke Detectors and Carbon Monoxide Alarms

New Jersey State Law requires all residences to be equipped with working smoke detectors, carbon monoxide alarms, and a fire extinguisher. Depending on when your home was constructed, or if a renovation was conducted, battery operated or electric smoke detectors are required on each level, and possibly in the bedrooms. Effective January 1, 2019, all battery operated smoke detectors must now have a ten year sealed battery. There must be an electric or battery operated carbon monoxide alarm in the hallway within ten feet of every bedroom door. The fire extinguisher must meet the minimum rating of 2A:10B:C, be purchased within the last year, and be mounted to the wall in an unobstructed location in the kitchen or within ten feet of the kitchen.

If you are selling or renting your residence, a certificate of smoke detector, carbon monoxide alarm, and fire extinguisher compliance is required prior to the closing or to the new tenant moving in. # Parks, Recreation & Community Services

## Recreation Sports Programs Offered Through COVID-19 Pandemic

As Governor Murphy began to lift restrictions on youth sports and camps at the start of summer, the Recreation Department began running programs implementing many new guidelines as required due to Covid-19. The following are some guidelines that were put in place for the youth sports programs as recommended and/or required by the New Jersey Department of Health.

- Any parents or spectators attending any recreation activity MUST wear face masks when proper social distancing cannot be maintained.

- Coaches are required to wear face masks anytime they are giving instruction in close proximity to team members, including both individual and group instruction.
- Players who are not actively engaged in activity should wear face masks when proper social distancing cannot be maintained.
- Social distancing signs have been placed around the parks.

- Parents are required to complete temperature screenings and health checks for their child before attending any activity.
- Equipment sharing between athletes is not allowed.

Over 3,600 youth participated in various sports programs during the summer and fall. Parents, coaches and athletes supported the guidelines and their overall feedback was positive.

## 2021 Day Camp and Teen Travel Camp

Despite the unusual circumstances surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, the Recreation Department still had a very successful summer with our 2020 Day Camp program. The camp was moved outdoors and trips were cancelled. However, despite not having the trips, the opportunity to be in the fresh air with peers was welcomed by all campers! The camp staff did an outstanding job keeping everyone safe while still giving the campers a fun and enjoyable summer. Safety measures included wearing masks all day (except when eating or drinking) and washing hands several times during camp hours. The feedback received from the end of camp survey was overwhelmingly positive! As a result, the Recreation Department has decided to make the move to outdoor Day Camp permanent. Day Camp will now be held at Freedom Park each summer. In addition, a seventh week of Day Camp for grades K-5 will be added. There will be some other changes and modifications that you will be able to find on the township website, [www.randolphnj.org](http://www.randolphnj.org), under Recreation.

**Day Camp** will be offered to children who have completed grades K-5. The 2021 camp dates will be June 21st – August 6th. The changes for 2021 include a total of 7 weeks with camps to be held at Freedom Park; rain days will be held at township schools. Campers will participate in activities such as sports, arts & crafts, hiking through Randolph trails, swimming at Randolph Lake and much more. Each week includes a special event such as a Carnival, Olympic Day, Talent Show, Camp BBQ and others. Weekly trips will also be offered. Examples of past trips include Dave & Buster's Arcade, Land of Make Believe, Liberty Science Center, Medieval Times, FunPlex, Turtle Back Zoo, and Camel Beach.

Registration for Day Camp Tier 1 pricing begins January 4th at 9:00 a.m.

**Teen Travel Camp** will provide campers with daily trips to locations such as Mountain Creek, Point Pleasant, Dorney Park, Great Adventure, Hurricane Harbor, Hershey Park and many others. This program provides 4-weeks of full-day trips and is open to those who have completed grades 6-8. The program will run from June 28th – July 23rd.

Registration for Teen Travel Camp begins January 18th at 9:00 a.m.

## Randolph Township Seasonal Job Fair

Randolph Parks and Recreation Department will host a seasonal job fair on Saturday, January 9th from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. This event is scheduled to take place at the Community Center located at 30 Calais Road, but will be based on the COVID Guidelines released closer to the fair. 

## Keep the Children Reading – Ways to Find More Books They Will Enjoy

"I can't find a book to read." This is a complaint that parents and librarians often hear from children. Maybe a child has finished all the books by a favorite author, or an interesting series, and now they don't know where else to look.

The library has several ways of helping younger (and not-so-young) readers find books similar to ones they have enjoyed in the past. First, there are many pages of booklists in the Children's Room. These list kids' books by genre such as adventure or animal stories. There are also booklists that highlight great books for beginning readers. There are similar trifolds booklists in the Teen Zone. In addition to the paper copies, these lists and more can be found on the library website at [www.randolphnj.org/library](http://www.randolphnj.org/library). Go to the Children and Teens tab and look under Book and Media Lists.

Another way to find similar books is by using NoveList. This database is available through our online catalog which you can access from the library website. Search for a book that you like, for example, *I Survived the Shark Attacks of 1916* by Lauren Tarshis. When you find the book you want, click on the link to get the full record; scroll through the record past the "Find a copy" section to "Suggestions and more." NoveList provides a list of the books in a series in order, as well as similar titles, authors and series. It will even highlight certain story elements such as "attention-grabbing" or "survival stories" to allow you to narrow your search to other books that NoveList believes share these features.

If you're stuck at home and want a book right away, don't forget to check out TumbleBooks. This database is also available through the library website. It has a variety of animated read-along picture books, e-books for middle school kids, and even graphic novels.

We hope these suggestions help you find the next book that's just right for you or your child.



The Pierson family is one of the well-established historical Randolph families with roots generations deep. This holiday advertisement in the December 6, 1895 edition of the IRON ERA newspaper is for the Dover, New Jersey clothing store 'Pierson & Co.' of William H. Pierson, Proprietor. William's family line started with his paternal great grandfather, Robert Pierson, who "was a farmer by occupation and was a gallant soldier in the war of the Revolution."\* In 1837 Robert's son, Henry Pierson, married Randolph resident Nancy Powers. When their son George turned 12, he left school to take over for his father Henry who had gone blind and could no longer work or run their Randolph family farm. George had an entrepreneurial spirit. At age 22, when he inherited a portion of the family homestead in Randolph, George went on to incorporate The Park Union Lumber Company located in Dover, and was President "of one of the most prominent lumber merchants in Morris County."\*\* In 1861, George married Elmira Youngs of Mount Freedom and had five children, including a son William born in 1863. William inherited his father's business sense and opened the 'Pierson & Co.' clothing store at one of the many of his father's commercial real estate holdings in Dover. In 1884, William married Laura Hedden from the Center Grove Section of Randolph. The 1910 U.S. Census documents William's 20 year old son George as a clerk and his 18 year old daughter Ethel as a dressmaker working at the store. The "ulster" noted in the advertisement was a man's coat, usually made of a heavy tweed fabric, a fashion that originated in the late 1800s in the county of Ulster, Ireland. Eventually, patterns for women's ulsters were created in 1898.

# Randolph Township Recycling Guidelines

Recyclables must be placed curbside no later than 6:00 a.m. – ideally they should be put out the night before collection. In the event of inclement weather, please visit [www.randolphnj.org](http://www.randolphnj.org) or call the Health Department at 973-989-7050 to determine if curbside collection has been canceled.

## Acceptable recycling materials for curbside collection

ALL of these items can be placed together in ONE container:	ACCEPTABLE – All must be empty, free of food debris, and rinsed
Household Plastic Containers	Plastic containers numbered 1, 2, & 5, juice boxes and other wax coated beverage cartons.
Aluminum & Metal Cans	Aluminum foil wrap, foil trays, and foil juice pouches. Includes aluminum, tin, and steel food cans. Empty and dry paint and aerosol cans.
Glass Bottles & Jars	Clear, green/blue & brown beverage and food containers.
Newspapers, Magazines, Catalogs, Books, and Phonebooks	Includes ads, inserts, postcards, hard cover, soft cover, and miscellaneous paper.
Cardboard (corrugated/chip board)	All corrugated paper materials, chipboard: cereal boxes, pizza boxes, gift boxes, scrap paper, egg cartons, paper cups, paper tubes, and wrapping paper.
Mixed Office Paper	Includes mail, envelopes, copy paper, office paper, and greeting cards.
Shredded Paper (personal, confidential documents generated in the home)	Please place in a paper bag. Bags must be securely tied. Put bags into the single-stream containers. <i>Do not put any plastic bags or loose shredded paper into the single-stream containers.</i>

**These items should NOT be included in single stream recycling:**

- ✓ Plastic bags
- ✓ Bio-hazardous waste
- ✓ Syringes
- ✓ Plastic CD cases
- ✓ Food or yard waste
- ✓ Fabrics or clothing
- ✓ Electronics
- ✓ Waxed paper or waxed cardboard
- ✓ Styrofoams
- ✓ VHS/VCR tapes
- ✓ Window panes or mirrors
- ✓ Household Batteries
- ✓ Scrap metal
- ✓ PVC
- ✓ Drinking glasses or light bulbs
- ✓ Ceramics or dishware
- ✓ Plastics numbered 3, 4, 6 & 7
- ✓ Paint, pesticides or oil

## Acceptable items to be dropped off at the Recycling Center

*These items may be dropped off at the Recycling Center for no fee, or call the Health Department to arrange for curbside pickup (a fee may be charged). If you have questions about whether an item is acceptable, please call the Health Department.*

RECYCLABLE ITEM	ACCEPTABLE
Electronic Waste	Televisions, computers, laptops, monitors, computer peripherals such as keyboards and mice, fax machines, VCRs and radios.
White Goods/Appliances/Metal	Large household appliances: stoves, refrigerators, washers, dryers, dishwashers, etc. Metal includes lawn chair frames and filing cabinets.
Grass Clippings	Available seasonally.
Brush/Tree Branches	Basic yard debris. Maximum acceptable branch size is 4 feet in length by 4 inches in diameter. (No stumps)
Christmas Trees	Trees must be bare with no stands, plastic bags, ornaments, lights, tinsel, etc. (Trees put out after January 8th WILL NOT be picked up by the township. Trees can be dropped off any time during normal working hours at the Recycling Center)
Leaves	Fall curbside collection per Department of Public Works schedule.
Tires – automobile, truck, and bike tires	Up to four tires. Remove steel rims which also can be recycled with metal.


