Members of the Township Council, the Township Manager and representatives from Morris Habitat for Humanity

On October 18th, Mayor Mark Forstenhauser, members of the Township Council and Township Manager Steve Mountain joined Morris Habitat for Humanity, State and County leaders and numerous other dignitaries to commemorate the groundbreaking for a 25-unit condominium project on Bennett Avenue. Upon its completion, the project will provide housing for low to moderate income families.

The groundbreaking ceremony kicked off the construction phase of a multi-stage redevelopment project that Randolph Township and Morris Habitat for Humanity have been partners on since 2007. The township acquired the 2.5 acre property on Bennett Avenue through a tax foreclosure, and spearheaded efforts to remediate the brownfield site utilizing funds from the township's affordable housing trust fund, a reserve account solely supported by affordable housing fees collected from township development projects. In July of this year, the property was transferred to Morris Habitat for Humanity under an agreement that they complete site improvements and construction of housing units using the balance of trust fund dollars dedicated for the remediation and proceeds from their own fundraising efforts.

Morris Habitat for Humanity is hoping to 'cut the ribbon' on the first completed affordable unit in 2022. The 25 units will be built on the site across four buildings, along with a community center, a playground and a gazebo. The Bennett Avenue project is the largest in the organization's thirty-five year history. To support this ambitious undertaking, Morris Habitat for Humanity is actively raising capital through a variety of different fundraising efforts. 2021 AND PRIOR YEAR(S) OPEN PROPERTY TAX AND WATER AND SEWER CHARGES

As the year comes to a close, please be sure that your tax and water and sewer charges are up to date. Any 2021 and prior year(s) open balances extending into 2022 may be subject to further action, including water and sewer shut off and tax sale. If your open charges are subject to tax sale, a lien will be placed on your property. For information regarding your payoff amount or any other questions, please contact the tax department at 973-989-7047 or the water and sewer department at 973-989-7063.

Randolph Township Welcomes New Residents

On September 25th, the Township Council hosted an open house at the Municipal Building to welcome and help orient new residents to the community.

The Township Council implemented the welcome program a few years ago as a means to address questions posed by new residents regarding the township government and services. This year's event coincided with the Country Fair, and featured an opportunity to meet with members of the Township Council, the Township Manager, and elected representatives from the State and County. After a brief presentation covering the township's operational structure and services, attendees were given a tour of the Municipal Building and the opportunity to ask questions and exchange ideas with their elected representatives.

Township Appoints New Chief Financial Officer

Debbie Bonanno has been appointed as the Township's new Chief Financial Officer, replacing Darren Maloney who retired from the position at the end of September. Ms. Bonanno comes to Randolph with over ten years of municipal government experience, having served most recently as the Borough Administrator/Chief Financial Officer in Franklin Borough and the Township Administrator of Mendham Township. Her background also includes over fifteen years of experience in public and corporate accounting. Ms. Bonanno possesses both a Certified Municipal Finance Officer (CMFO) license as well as a Qualified Purchasing Agent (QPA) designation. She is a graduate of Youngstown State University, where she earned a Bachelors of Science in Business Administration and the Rutgers University Financial Management Program.

Ms. Bonanno has a daughter who is a nurse practitioner and a son who serves with the Navy in a Seabee Unit. In her free time, she enjoys cycling and spending time with her dogs.

Christmas Tree Collection

The Randolph Township Public Works Department will be picking up residents' Christmas trees this holiday season. The trees must be bare with no stands, ornaments, lights, tinsel, etc. Christmas trees must be put out at the curb no later than January 10th.

Trees put out later than this date WILL NOT be picked up by the township. However, Christmas trees will be accepted at the Recycling Center anytime during normal working hours.



Ironia Road Renamed Ironia Mendham Road

On October 7th the Township Council passed an ordinance to change the name of Ironia Road in Randolph Township to Ironia Mendham Road. Numerous residents on the road have long experienced delivery issues as they shared duplicate addresses with Ironia Road in Chester Township, located several miles away, which also has the 07869 zip code. Randolph officials have reached out to the Postal Service over the years to request a zip code change for the road in Chester, but were only able to get the four digit zip code extension added.

Recently, there were several occurrences in which emergency services arrived at the Randolph location for incidents in Chester and vice versa. Fortunately, the response delays did not result in permanent harm, but they did highlight the potential seriousness of the duplicate addresses. The name Ironia Mendham Road was chosen as this was the name of the road prior to 1972. If customers forget and use the old road name, not to worry: the Postal Service has already linked it to the new name in their computer system.

Flu Vaccines Available by Appointment

Get your family vaccinated against flu this season. The Randolph Township Health Department carries flu vaccine for children (6 months and up), adults, and seniors. To schedule a flu vaccine, please call the Public Health Nurses at 973-537-7118. The vaccine is free for uninsured, underinsured, NJ Family Care, and Medicare Part B, or available for \$20 cash or check for those with private insurance.

Health Department Offers Vaccines for Adults and Children

The Randolph Township Health Department offers vaccine clinics for adults (Section 317 vaccines) as well as Vaccine For Children (VFC). These vaccines are available to those who are uninsured or underinsured.

Protect your Pipes and Water Meter this Winter

Winter weather is right around the corner, so now is the time to conduct inspections and maintenance around your home to prevent water damages from frozen pipes and water meters.

Why Water Freezing is a Problem

As the outside temperature falls, water inside non-insulated pipes and water meters will expand as it freezes and generate increased pressure on whatever is containing it. Regardless of the strength of materials, expanding water can cause pipes and meters to break.

Typically, pipes and water meters that freeze are:

- Pipes that are exposed to severe cold such as outdoor hose bibs and swimming pool and water sprinkler supply lines.
- Water supply pipes and water meters in unheated interior areas like basements and crawl spaces, attics, garages, or kitchen cabinets.
- Pipes that run against exterior walls that have little or no insulation.

How to Protect Pipes and Water Meters from Freezing

To protect pipes and water meters from freezing, you should take action outdoors before the onset of cold weather, and indoors once it's here:

Outdoors:

- Drain water from swimming pool and water sprinkler supply lines following manufacturer's or installer's directions.
- Remove, drain, and store outdoor hoses. Close inside valves supplying outdoor hose bibs. Open the outside hose bibs to allow water to drain. Keep the outside valve open so that any water remaining in the pipe can expand without causing the pipe to break.
- Add insulation to attics, basements and crawl spaces. Insulation will maintain higher temperatures in these areas.
- Check around the home for other areas where water supply lines and water meters are located in unheated areas. Both hot and cold water pipes and water meters in these areas should be insulated.
- Consider installing specific products made to insulate water pipes like a "pipe sleeve" or installing UL-listed "heat tape," "heat cable," or similar materials on exposed water pipes.
- To provide increased protection from freezing, consider relocating exposed pipes and water meters.

Indoors:

- Open kitchen and bathroom cabinet doors to allow warmer air to circulate around the plumbing.
- When the weather is very cold outside, let the cold water drip from the faucet served by exposed pipes. Running water through the pipe, even at a trickle, helps prevent pipes from freezing.
- Keep the thermostat set to the same temperature both during the day and at night. By temporarily suspending the use of lower nighttime temperatures, you may incur a higher heating bill, but you can prevent a much more costly repair job if pipes freeze and burst.
- If you will be traveling during cold weather, leave the heat on in your home; set to a temperature no lower than 55° F.

Tips for Generator Usage during Power Outages

The Randolph Township Fire Official and Jersey Central Power & Light remind customers to take precautions when using generators during power outages. To ensure the safety of residents as well as that of utility company employees who may be working on power lines in the area, the proper generator should be selected and installed by a qualified electrician. At a minimum, such generators should be sized to support the operation of a furnace, refrigerator/freezer, and at least one light. If you have medical equipment or other special equipment in your home, those too should be able to work off of the generator. Many township residents have wells for their water; a more powerful generator is required to keep the well pumps operational. Improperly installed generators can malfunction, resulting in injury or even death.

Generators should be placed away from the structure, in a well-ventilated area and always have a working carbon monoxide (CO) detector in your home. The fire department receives many CO calls during storms, and often finds generators running in a dangerous location.

Snow Removal Reminders

Snow Removal and Mailbox Damage

One of the unintended consequences of any municipal snow removal program is mailbox damage. In most cases, damage to mailboxes results from snow being displaced from truck plows into the township right-of-way. The township plow drivers make every effort to avoid such damage; however, sometimes the impact on mailboxes is unavoidable.

Residents are advised that it is the policy of the township to not replace mailboxes damaged during the snow removal process.

To guard against mailbox damage, we ask that residents ensure proper mailbox placement within the township right-of-way. Mailboxes should not protrude beyond the curb line into the street as to prevent any damage from plows removing snow from township streets. The United States Postal Service has guidelines regarding mailbox placement which can be found at www.usps.com/manage/mailboxes.htm; these guidelines can also be found on the township website at randolphnj.org.

Residents are encouraged to check mailboxes now to ensure that they are as secure as possible.

Snow Removal Ordinance

Local Ordinance #44-82 states that if the sidewalk in front of your house is on a "Designated Walking Route" for school children, you are required to clear the sidewalks of any snow or ice accumulation within 12 hours of daylight following a snow or ice event. If your sidewalk is not on a designated walking route, it must still be cleared within 24 hours of daylight following a snow or ice event.

Local Ordinance #44-84 states that no person shall place, cause to be placed, or permit to be placed, any snow or ice upon any street, road or sidewalk within the township in any manner that will obstruct or impede vehicular or pedestrian traffic, or block any access to any street, road or sidewalk.

Please note that neither residents, nor private contractors, are permitted to push snow from their property into or across the street.

Clear the Hydrants After Snow Events

The Fire Department asks all residents to clear the fire hydrants after snow storms. Please check for your nearest hydrant, even if it is not on your property, and shovel it out. Fire hydrants that are not cleared are hard to find, and difficult to operate. Your effort saves firefighters valuable time in an emergency and could save a life.

A Letter from the Superintendent

At the beginning of the school year our staff gathered to listen to educational neuroscience, trauma, and adversity expert, Dr. Lori Desautels. While the wellness of our community has always been our highest priority, now more than ever we are taking additional measures to ensure the wellbeing of our learning community. In addition to Dr. Desautel's presentation, she connected with, and will continue to connect with, our staff. Her ongoing discussion will focus on how applied educational neuroscience can help educators meet students where they are. By better understanding the developing brains of children, we will continue to provide additional wellness opportunities for our school community.

Our staff annual Day of Wellness focused on the impact of stress and trauma on the brain. Multiple sessions were offered to provide strategies that can help educators support the mental and physical needs of every child. The district, in anticipation of future federal grant funding opportunities, also hired a Thrive Alliance Clinician who is being shared by all elementary schools. Our clinician provides custom, school-based mental health services that address the particular needs of students. We have had a partnership with Thrive Alliance Group for several years with a full-time dedicated professional already in place at RHS and RMS. In addition, District Supervisor of School Counseling

and psychologist Colleen Huguenin has also had a transformative impact on Randolph's mental health programs, which includes the district's Overcoming Anxiety Student Independence Support (OASIS) program. Her extensive experience will continue to enhance the mental, social and emotional resources we provide students.

We recognize that students will always need additional social, emotional and psychological support. As a learning community, our commitment to address these needs head-on will ensure every child receives necessary care. The examples shared are just a few of the many ways we are working hard to improve the wellness opportunities provided to our Randolph students.

As we enter the new year, it's important that wellness, social and emotional health continue to be a top priority. Our students cannot excel without the proper supports in place, and we will continue to go above and beyond to provide exceptional care. As a community, I hope everyone will take the time to also practice self-care and prioritize mental health. Let's make 2022 an additional year of healing for our community as we embark on another great year.

Randolph Township Recycling Guidelines

Recyclables must be placed curbside no later than 6:00 a.m., ideally they should be put out the night before collection. Recyclables must be placed in reusable containers, NOT in plastic bags. In the event of inclement weather, please visit randolphnj.org or call the Health Department at 973-989-7050 to determine if curbside collection has been canceled.

Changes to Acceptable Recycling Items Beginning 2022

Due to restrictions and changing recycling market requirements, the Morris County Municipal Utilities Authority (MCMUA) has implemented changes to some items previously accepted for recycling. The specific items listed below are not acceptable:

- Plastic bags and plastic film. Many supermarkets provide bins for collection of plastic bags for recycling. Also, recyclables should never be placed in plastic bags.
- Shredded paper. Residents should take advantage of the biannual shredding program.
- Aerosol cans, pressurized cans and paint cans.
- Pizza boxes.

Acceptable recycling materials for curbside collection

ALL of these items can be placed together in ONE container:	ACCEPTABLE – All must be empty, free of food debris, and rinsed
Household Plastic Containers	Plastic containers numbered 1, 2, & 5, juice boxes and other wax coated beverage cartons.
Aluminum & Metal Cans	Aluminum foil wrap, foil trays, and foil juice pouches. Includes aluminum, tin and steel food cans.
Glass Bottles & Jars	Clear, green/blue & brown beverage and food containers.
Newspapers, Magazines, Catalogs, Books, and Phonebooks	Includes ads, inserts, postcards, hard cover, soft cover, and miscellaneous paper.
Cardboard (corrugated/chip board)	All corrugated paper materials, chipboard: cereal boxes, gift boxes, scrap paper, egg cartons, paper cups, paper tubes, and wrapping paper.
Mixed Office Paper	Includes mail, envelopes, copy paper, office paper, and greeting cards.

These items should NOT be included in single stream recycling:

Acceptable items to be dropped off at the Recycling Center

These items may be dropped off at the Recycling Center for no fee, or call the Health Department to arrange for curbside pickup (a fee may be charged). If you have questions about whether an item is acceptable, please call the Health Department.

RECYCLABLE ITEM	ACCEPTABLE
Electronic Waste	Televisions, computers, laptops, monitors, computer peripherals such as keyboards and mice, fax machines, VCRs and radios.
White Goods/Appliances/Metal	Large household appliances: stoves, refrigerators, washers, dryers, dishwashers, etc. Metal includes lawn chair frames and filing cabinets.
Grass Clippings	Available seasonally.
Brush/Tree Branches	Basic yard debris. Maximum acceptable branch size is 4 feet in length by 4 inches in diameter. (No stumps)
Christmas Trees	Trees must be bare, with no stands, plastic bags, ornaments, lights, tinsel, etc. (Trees put out after January 10th WILL NOT be picked up by the township. Trees can be dropped off any time during normal working hours at the Recycling Center)
Leaves	Fall curbside collection per Department of Public Works schedule.
Tires – automobile, truck, and bike tires	Up to four tires. Remove steel rims which also can be recycled with metal.
