The goal is to honor our dead and to help heal the wounds of this divisive conflict.

Visitors sought out the names of loved ones lost in the conflict, many making "rubblings" with crayon and paper, with some leaving mementos along the wall. All who visited the "Moving Wall" paid tribute to the over 58,000 soldiers who never returned home. Thank you to all who contributed to the success of this event.

A Message from the Mayor



Fall in Randolph means it's time for the Country Fair! The 15th annual Country Fair will be held at Veterans Community Park on Saturday, September 24. (The rain date is September 25). There will be vendors, hayrides, live music, food and BMX shows throughout the day. Shuttles from Ironia School, Heistein Park, Heistein Pond, and the Randolph Community Center will be available.

Fall is also a wonderful time to think about cleaning up our homes and our beautiful township. Fall Bulk Collection Week is an easy way to get rid of unwanted household items. All items must be placed at the curb by 6:00 a.m. on Monday, September 19. Blue Diamond, our trash contractor, will make one trip through each street for this collection and will not make return trips. Please visit page 8 of this newsletter for detailed instructions regarding bulk collection.

Items never collected during the bi-annual bulk collection and/or weekly curbside trash collection include all recyclable items (metal, paper, e-waste), prohibited items (hazardous waste, building materials, and items weighing more than 200 lbs.), and vegetative waste. Do you have questions about what Randolph recycles? There is an app for that: *Recycle Coach*. Download the app and you can see what can be recycled and what should go into the garbage.

Another opportunity to freshen up our community is by participating in our Clean Communities Day on Saturday, September 24. Volunteers can sign up by calling the Health Department at 973-989-7050. All participants will receive gloves, garbage bags, and t-shirts. Mini-grants are available for civic groups. Randolph's Clean Communities program is part of a statewide strategy to prevent the accumulation of litter on streets, beaches, waterways, parks, recreation sites, and vacant

lots. To support this program, Randolph holds two "Clean Communities Days" each year: one in the spring and one in the fall.

September also means "back to school". Please be careful of children walking or biking to and from school. As a reminder for when you are behind a school bus, "If the lights are flashing, don't try passing!"

NOTICE TO ALL TAX PAYERS

Whereas, N.J.S.A. 54:4-67 permits the governing body to set the rate of interest to be charged for delinquent taxes, assessments, or other municipal charges, or to be charged a year-end penalty; and

Whereas, **Resolution No. 01-22** was adopted by the governing body to charge the rate of interest on delinquent taxes, assessments, and water & sewer charges at 8% on the first \$1,500.00 of delinquent charges and 18% on any amount in excess of \$1,500.00 and a penalty of 6% shall be charged for any delinquency in excess of \$10,000 which has not been paid, as billed, prior to the end of the calendar year.

Therefore, all tax payers are advised that the rates of interest and year end penalty take effect with the calendar year 2022.

The Historical Society of Randolph

In the early 1600s through the 1700s, folks who died were often buried on their farm nearby in a piece of land bordering their property line. Sometimes a church had an onsite graveyard, as with Millbrook Methodist Cemetery. In time, however, family farms or sacred churchyards were not the only sites for burials. After the bloody War Between the States in the 1860s and during decades of diseases such as anthrax, yellow fever, typhoid, cholera, and the Spanish Flu, towns started creating large cemeteries away from the general population to bury the dead. Especially during the Victorian era, cemeteries allowed art inspired obelisks and statuary with the names of the deceased, located on landscaped grounds or acres of rolling hills. A new trend then started in London, England. During the mid-1800s, close to 100 old burial grounds became public gardens or children's playgrounds due to the lack of open green space available. This trend also came to some neighborhood cemeteries in the United States. Cemeteries during a spring or summer Sunday afternoon could find children playing between the graves, blankets or quilts spread with picnic baskets, and people taking walks along the cemetery's paths. It was not unusual for some families to come together at the cemetery to commemorate their dead loved one's birthday or celebrate holidays that included the deceased. Locally, purported cemetery picnic sites included Locust Hill Cemetery in Dover (incorporated in 1867), and Walnut Grove Baptist Church Cemetery on West Hanover Avenue in Randolph (incorporated approximately 1787).



Affordable Housing Update

A Final Compliance Hearing on the township's affordable housing plan has been scheduled before the Court on September 29, 2022. Approval of the plan will conclude more than six years of litigation between the township, interested parties, interveners and objectors. Obligations for the First and Second Rounds of COAH regulations (1987-1999) are formally established. Randolph was assigned an obligation of 261 affordable units for this time period. The township satisfied the entirety of this obligation and has credit for an additional 207 units for projects that have already been completed or have approval. The township has a 643-unit cumulative Third Round (1999-2025) obligation based upon the fair share methodology calculated in a report prepared for Morris County at the direction of the Honorable Maryann L. Nergaard, JSC by Court Order of June 20, 2017. The township's affordable housing plan before the Court for approval contains the proposed mechanisms to address this Third Round obligation. These mechanisms include new inclusionary housing projects, 100% affordable housing projects and the rezoning of vacant or underdeveloped properties. Recycling Tips

When it comes to recycling we all have to do our part. Recycling benefits our environment and it also impacts favorably on the township budget and your taxes. Keeping the recycling stream clean is an important part of the process. Here are some simple tips to remember as you recycle.

- 1. Make sure it's clean, empty and dry.** Food waste contaminates whole loads of recyclable material, rendering them useless and fast-tracking them to landfills
- 2. Keep cardboard recyclables dry.** Wet cardboard jams recycling plants. Recycling containers with lids may be purchased at local retail stores.
- 3. No plastic bags.** Plastic bags are the number-one contaminant in recycling loads. Grocery bags must be recycled at a specific drop-off area, not your curbside bin.
- 4. Don't recycle anything smaller than a credit card.** That includes straws, bottle caps, coffee pods, plastic cutlery, and paperclips. These objects are too small to be sorted and can jam the recycling equipment.
- 5. Get kids involved.** Teach them about the importance of recycling and caring for their environment.
- 6. Teach yourself.** Download the *Recycle Coach* app to learn how to properly sort recyclables and get reminders about trash and recycle days specifically for Randolph.

Phone and Email Scams are on the Rise

The Randolph Police Department warns residents that there has been an increase in phone and email scams. There are many different types of scams or scenarios that criminals use to attempt to trick victims into sending money or compromising their personal information. These often rely on building a sense of urgency around an issue that requires financial assistance. One common scam is the “Grandparent Scam”.

In this scenario, victims will receive a phone call from someone posing as their grandchild. The scammer will likely sound scared or frantic and say they are in trouble. In many instances, they’ll say they were arrested for drunk driving or another crime, or in a motor vehicle crash, usually providing just enough information to make it sound plausible. They’ll request you wire money or purchase a prepaid card, such as a Green Dot, and provide the caller the account number on the card in order to withdraw the funds. *Remember, police departments will never ask for money over the telephone.* Here are some helpful “dos and don’ts” from the AARP website (aarp.org) to avoid scams like the Grandparent Scam.

Dos:

- Set privacy settings on your social media accounts so only people you know can access your posts and photos. Scammers search social media for information to fool you.
- Do hang up immediately and call the grandchild or other family member in question on a known number to make sure they are safe and to confirm it is a scam.
- Do contact other family members or friends if you have any concerns that the emergency could be real. Scammers will plead to keep the situation secret to avoid this.
- If you speak with someone who claims to be a police officer, call the relevant law enforcement agency to verify the person’s identity and any information they’ve provided.
- Do trust your instincts. If something doesn’t feel right, it probably isn’t.

Don’ts:

- Don’t drop your guard because the number on your caller ID looks familiar. Scammers use technological tricks to make it appear as if they’re calling from a trusted number.
- Don’t volunteer information. Scammers fish for facts they can use to make the impersonation believable. For example, if the caller says, “It’s me, grandpa!” don’t say your grandchild’s name. Wait for the caller to say it.
- Don’t let a caller rush you into making a decision.
- Don’t send cash, wire money, or provide numbers from gift or cash reload cards. Scammers prefer these payment methods because they’re difficult to trace.
- Don’t panic, no matter how dire the situation sounds. Scam artists rely on vulnerability to distract you from spotting the ruse.

Keep Leaves Off the Roads

The Randolph Police are asking for your help in keeping the roads safe during the fall months. Leaf piles in the roadway can be difficult to see at night, slippery when wet, and narrow the passage for cars to safely pass one another. Please rake, sweep, or place your leaves curbside along the public street, no sooner than seven days prior to their scheduled pick up. Below is an excerpt from Local Ordinance 42-69:

Leaves.

(1) Placement. Property owners, tenants of property owners, agents of property owners or tenants, contractors of property owners or tenants and landscapers of property owners or tenants may place leaves in sealed biodegradable bags curbside along public streets throughout leaf collection season provided that sealed biodegradable bags shall not be placed less than ten feet from any storm drain inlet, nor shall they create a hazard for vehicles.

(2) Sweeping, blowing, raking, and dumping of leaves. Property owners, tenants of property owners, agents of property owners or tenants, contractors of property owners or tenants and landscapers of property owners or tenants may sweep, blow, rake, or dump leaves onto the curbside of public streets fronting a resident’s property during leaf collection season within the seven day period before the scheduled leaf collection day (published in the fall town newsletter and posted on the town web site) provided that the leaves shall not be placed less than ten feet from any storm drain inlet, nor shall they create a hazard for vehicles.

Randolph Rescue Squad

Essential Information Needed for EMS Calls

Hopefully, you or your family will never need the Randolph Rescue Squad (RRS) in an emergency. However, if you do, RRS members are 100% ready. What about you? Here are some tips on how you can help our EMS crew:

Provide Basic Patient Information: Name (not nickname), date of birth, home address, phone numbers, medical history, medications, allergies. Explain why the 9-1-1 call was made and what the patient was doing when the illness/injury occurred. If the patient is a child or an adult unable to respond, a parent, guardian, or caregiver should provide the information.

Personal Preparations:

- Install large/reflective house numbers. Turn on exterior lights after calling 911.
- Post a list of current medications, medical history, and allergies on your refrigerator and keep one on your person. Copies for the EMS crew are helpful.
- Wear a medical alert bracelet or necklace, especially if vocal communication is limited. Alert

- EMS crew members to conditions such as seizure disorders, developmental or cognitive disorders, diabetes, heart, organ issues, etc.
- If you have a Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) order or a Physician Order for Life Saving Treatment (POLST), post copies and keep copies with you or with a caregiver. EMS crews are only permitted to act on those signed documents if physical copies are available..

Other Considerations:

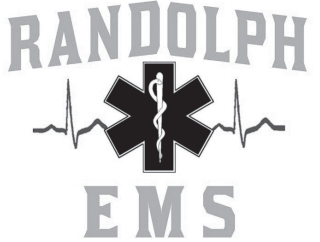
- EMS crews provide that same basic information to the hospital ER staff.
- Parents and guardians have the right to authorize or decline treatment and transport of their children. If a parent or guardian is not available and a child needs emergency care for a life-threatening injury, we will provide treatment and transport.
- However, other family members, family friends, or caregivers are not permitted to authorize or decline care on their own. IMPORTANT: If you are, or if you have someone regularly caring for a child, consider

a written power of attorney that provides the ability to give consent for treatment.

- Does the patient HAVE to go to the hospital if the ambulance and crew have been called? A patient must consent to evaluation, treatment, and transport to the hospital. At any point during treatment by the EMS crew, patients have the right to decline further care and/or transportation to a hospital. The EMS crew explains the risks associated with discontinuing treatment and/or transport. If the patient still declines, he or she will be asked to sign a Refusal of Medical Assistance (RMA) form.

Solicitation in the Township

The Township of Randolph has received many questions from residents regarding solicitors approaching their homes. Many aspects of door-to-door solicitation are protected by the Constitution; however, in order to manage the activity, towns are able to establish guidelines for solicitation through local ordinance. Below is some information related to solicitation in Randolph Township:

- A Soliciting Application must be completed by each individual and submitted to the Township Clerk.
- A background check through the state and local police must be completed and approved.
- The permit, which includes a photo, must be carried by the permittee at all times while soliciting, and supplied upon request.

- No permittee shall solicit before 9:00 a.m. or after 7:00 p.m. of any day, or at any time on Sunday.
- No nonprofit-making vendor shall solicit before 9:00 a.m. or after 9:00 p.m. on any day of the week.
- Permittee must request the township’s No Solicitation List from the Township Clerk’s office each day, and may not approach any property on the list.
- Permittee may not approach any property which has a No Solicitation sign posted.

Most permitted solicitors in the township abide by the regulations; however, some do not follow the regulations. In addition, there may be individuals approaching properties who have not gone through

the proper application/permitting process to obtain a solicitation permit. Residents whose properties are wrongly approached or who experience an aggressive or rude encounter by a solicitor are advised to obtain the name of the individual, the name of the business for which they are soliciting, and to call the Randolph Township Police Department’s non-emergency line at 973-989-7000 and press 0 for dispatch. It is important that residents call at the time of the incident so that an officer can be dispatched to the area to locate the individual and discuss the township’s solicitation regulations. If you have questions about the solicitation ordinance, please call the Township Clerk’s office at 973-989-7041. The Randolph Township Fire Dept. (RTFD) has been out in the community! In addition to responding to emergency calls and alarms, you may have seen us at the Freedom Festival and Vietnam Veterans Moving Wall Ceremony. We are happy to be out seeing you, the members of the community we serve. Feel free to ask an officer or firefighter any questions about our department and how you can help—we are always looking for members. We'll be at the Randolph Country Fair on September 24 at Veterans Community Park.

September 11, 2022 marks the 21st anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks. The RTFD honors the 343 firefighters lost that day along with the 71 police officers, 55 military personnel and 2,508 civilians. Many of the RTFD members joined the department because of the events that took place that day. We will never forget.

With school back in session, please be cautious on the roadways and watch for children and school buses. The township fire inspectors along with the fire department are returning to Randolph schools this year to teach fire safety and prevention to our youngest township residents.

Fire Prevention Week is October 9-15. The National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®) has announced **Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape™** as the theme for Fire Prevention Week, reinforcing the critical importance of developing a home escape plan with all members of the household and practicing it regularly. Although the week focused on fire prevention, the goal is to practice it year-round, to raise fire safety awareness, and help ensure your home and family are protected. Remember to change the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. If the detector is more than ten years old, check the manufacturer's label to see if it should be replaced. Also, don't forget to check household fire extinguishers' expiration dates and charge levels.

Top Tips for Fire Safety

1. Install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors on every level of your home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas.
2. Test detectors every month.
3. Talk with all family members about a fire escape plan and practice the plan twice a year.
4. If a fire occurs in your home, GET OUT, STAY OUT and CALL FOR HELP.

White-Tailed Deer Hunting

The 2022-2023 bow hunting season began on September 10. Randolph's Wildlife Management Advisory Committee (WMAC) oversees the Township hunting program, designating public open lands for hunting, assigning area "Captains" to oversee hunting activities on property owned or managed by the township, and approving hunters to obtain local access permits.

While the trail system remains open during most of the hunting season, residents should be aware that hunting is taking place in public open space. Please pay attention to signs posted on the trailheads and updates on the township website regarding any potential closures.

Permitted hunters must display a vehicle tag on their rear-view mirror and have armbands with their permit visible. As determined by the NJ Division of Fish and Wildlife, hunting season lasts from early-September through mid-February. Residents interested in establishing a neighborhood hunt may obtain information by emailing deerhunt@randolphnj.org.

The WMAC maintains a list of licensed hunters and can act as an information resource. Our goal is to restore the environmental balance by reducing the population of white-tailed deer. Over time, we have seen regeneration in the forest understory which helps ensure that future generations can enjoy healthy woodlands.

2022 Leaf Collection Information

The Department of Public Works will begin the township's annual Leaf Collection Program at the end of October. The anticipated collection schedule by district can be found in the graphic on the right:

- Residents, landscapers, contractors, and lawn services may place loose leaves at the curb.
- Leaves should be placed only in locations on the property ten or more feet from any storm sewer inlet on the street.
- Only leaves should be placed at the curb; brush, grass, rocks and any other materials should never be included with the leaves.
- Leaves cannot be placed at the curb any earlier than seven days prior to the week of the scheduled collection date.**
- Leaves need to be placed at the curb prior to the Saturday in which your district is scheduled to begin pick up.**
- Residents are urged to dispose of leaves on their own properties whenever possible since the stormwater regulations instituted by the state make it necessary to reduce the volume of leaves placed at the street.

- Blowing leaves into wooded areas, placing leaves on acid loving plants such as pachysandra, or creating backyard compost piles will minimize costs associated with the collection and trucking of the leaves to a compost facility outside the township limits. Such disposal in wooded areas or on acid loving plants is also beneficial to properties.
- Placing leaves and other yard waste on township parkland and open space is not permitted and is a violation of state regulations.

Violations of any of the above requirements will continue to be enforced by the Health Department and could result in a court summons being issued.

For residents who prefer to place leaves in biodegradable bags instead of waiting for their district's scheduled collection, the Department of Public Works will collect the bags on Mondays. However, residents must schedule a Monday collection by calling the Engineering Department at 973-989-7066 by 3:30 p.m. on the prior Friday. This service is offered as a courtesy to residents.

Bulk Trash Collection Week

The fall bulk trash collection will take place the week of September 19 - September 23. **Bulk items must be at the curb prior to 6:00 a.m. Monday, September 19.** This collection is simply an extension of your one-item-of-bulk-trash per weekly curbside collection service available to residents throughout the year. Recyclable items (i.e., metal, paper) and prohibited items (i.e., waste building material, items weighing more than 200 lbs.) will not be picked up. Please be sure to clearly separate regular household trash from your bulk collection items. Loose items must be in trash cans or disposable bags; do not place any items in a box that you would like to have collected. Latex paint **MUST** be dried out. Paint cans should be placed in a trash container or paint should be poured into a garbage bag with kitty litter. Mixture must be solid.
